### I thank God for you and what you do for the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Your generous offerings of time, talent, and treasure make a difference in sharing the Kingdom visibly in Mount Dora and around the world. It is extraordinary what God does through ordinary people like you and me.

However, sometimes we can wonder if our gifts are really making a difference. We can be come cynical and feel others may be "gaming the system." I remember volunteering at a food pantry in Sebring, Florida where I was serving as a student minister during seminary. We gave out bags of food to over 100 people every Friday. I commented to the pantry's director that it looked like some people didn't need these food donations. I was passing judge ment because one couple would drive up to the pantry in a Cadillac to pick up their food bag. He responded with something profound that has stuck with me to this day: "You've got to get past the greed to get to the need."

Indeed, I would say it was only 4 or 5 people out of the 100 who worked the system at that food pantry. The director wasn't going to let a few dishonest folks dictate how he was going to treat others who were hungry and had a great need. Looking back, I realize he wasn't just talking about the greed of those who take advantage of others, but also the greed you or I use to justify withholding our best from God.

When I examine my heart, I realize that sometimes I have a distorted view of why I give to God. Maybe you can relate. I like to feel appreciated, to please others, and to help those who "really" need it. When I look deeply at my motivations, I realize, at times, I have actually traded material greed for emotional greed, full of self-righteousness, self-actualization, and appreciation. I have placed secondary personal concerns over the primary purpose of offering myself and my gifts to God.

I love the story of the widow's mite Mark 12 and Luke 21. She gave all she had. She did not tip God with the leftovers. We can also tell her heart was in the right place. Jesus compares her giving to that of the Pharisees who give out of a sense of duty and self-righteousness. The Pharisees had that emotional greed too. Do we give for superficial reasons like the Pharisees or for supernatural reasons like the widow?

At our November 7 services, we will have an opportunity to consider our commitments to Christ through the work of First United Method ist Church in 2022. We can commit through our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. In fulfilling these five vows of commitment, we can offer what God wants most: our giving hearts. It is not the quantity of what we offer that matters most to God, it is the quality. May we offer God our best through a giving heart. May we get past the greed to get to the need.

# Spring of Revival Ministry in Belarus

For over 20 years, Spring of Revival has provid ed material help and spiritual growth to social orphans, families, orphanage graduates and individuals with special needs. This includes running camps, weekly events, and Night to Shine. The average age is 5-15 along with a group of orphaned teenagers ages 16-20. Many go on to become leaders in the ministry.

Be a witness to God's love by writing a card or letter to a young person in Belarus and placing it in the mailbox in the Fifth Avenue entrance by **Dec. 5**. These will be mailed to Belarus, translated, and distributed among participants in the ministry. To help finan cially, write "Belarus" on the memo line of your check or give online to "Missions."
